It is primarily intended to study/examine the connections between women and nature with special emphasis on their unavoidable interconnectedness with environment. From the postcolonial perspective, it can also be viewed as an attempt to address the issue of subjugation of women, nature and environment with special reference to environmental injustices as against preservation of Environmental Ethics. Rousseau's concept of environmental ethics can be correlated with the concept of environmental justice which is more explicitly linked to racial politics- the reason why scholars tend to emphasize environmental racism in African American fiction with special reference to Toni Morrison. Ecofeminism is grounded upon the conception that the ideology which recommends oppression of women on the basis of race, class, gender, sexuality etc. is exactly the same ideology which sanctions the oppression of nature. Women, environment and nature are therefore, three important segments of ecofeminism. In Toni Morrison's *The Bluest Eye* offers a compelling narrative that interweaves ecological metaphors with gendered and racial oppression, thereby foregrounding The experiences of Black women and marginalised communities in America.

Although *The Bluest Eye* compares women destiny with nature, and uncovers the double pressures from white culture and men suffered by Negro women, criticizing ruling logic which gives oppression to Negro women and nature. In *The Bluest Eye*, Morrison offers a profound critique of codified and institutionalized. white language and ideology through the subversion of a school primer that privileges whiteness. The Black family and community play a very important and dominating role in the black individual's life. Because of the lack of parents' love and irresponsibility of the Community, Pecala loses her sanity while with the love of the support from their family, Claudia and her sister Frieda grow up healthily. In *The Bluest Eye* the black culture is portrayed mainly through the black blues and Aunt Jimmy's funeral. In *The Bluest Eye* Morrison is specifically connected with a particularly impalable from raciest ideology that because of its indefinable nature, is Paradoxically more pervasive, psychologically damaging and difficult to contest than extreme and overt forms of racism. When cholly Breedlove reduces his family to state of homelessness, puts them all “outdoors”, daudia, the no mature narrators, reflects upon her new awareness of the Social, psychological and economic constraints on the black communities. This novel very beautifully depicts the comparison, relation, and state of Nature and women. The novel is divided onto the four reasons, but it pointedly refuses to meet the expectations of these seasons. For example, spring, the traditional time of rebirth and renewal new lights, colors and new ways reminds Claudia of being whipped with new switches and it is the season when Pecola is raped, Pecola's baby dies in autumn, the season of harvesting. Morrison used natural cycles to underline the unnaturalness and misery af her characters, especially female characters experiences. To some degree She also questions The benevolence of nature as when claudia wonders whether “The earth itself might have been unyielding to someone like Pecola. Examle of marigolds is also used by Morrisons when Claudia and Frieda associate marigold with the safety and wet well being of Pecola and baby. Their ceremonial offering of money have and the marigolds they have plated grow, then Pecola's baby will be all right. More generally marigolds represent the constant renewal of nature. In Pecola's case, this cycle of renewal is perverted by her father's rape of her.

Ecofeminism emphasizes that patriarchal capitalism exploits both women and nature, treating them as passive, Consumable, and disposable Morrison's fictional down of Lorain, ohio is not merely a backdrop but an active force shaping identity, suffering, and resistance. The infertile soil, decaying houses and seasonal cycles all parallel the lives of women who are denied nourishment agency and voice. By applying an ecofeminist and gendered, environmental framework, the study reveals how Morrison Critiques systemic racism and patriarchy through ecological symbolism and Spatial politics.

Theoretical Framework: Ecofeminism and Gendered Ecology.

Ecofeminism emerged in the 1970s through Scholars such as Francoise d'Eaubonne, Vandana shiva, and Carolyn Merchant, who 'argued that the domination of women, and nature stems from the same patriarchal ideology ecofeminism challenges binaries such as

- Power Powerlessness.

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A gendered environmental perspective highlights how environmental conditions housing, sanitation, food and land affect women differently due to social hierarchies. Morrison Structures the novel around The four seasons, traditionally symbols of renewal and balance. However, in *The Bluest Eye*, seasons bring no healing. Winter is harsh, spring does not bloom, and summer intensifies trauma. This distortion of natural cycles symbolizes ecological imbalance caused by social injustice. Ecofeminist theory argues that when harmony between humans and nature is domination both suffer irreparably.

Women, Domestic spaces and Environmental Violence:

Domestic spaces in the novel are not nurturing environments. Pecola's home is described as a cold, broken and Hostile mirroring her emotional neglect. The house fails to function as a protective ecological unit, ecological ecofeminism critiques the romanticization as house as a safe female space. Morrison exposes how patriarchal and racial forces poison domestic ecology, turning homes into sites of violence rather than refuge.

Cholly Breedlove embodies destructive masculinity shaped by racial humiliation. His violence toward Pecola is not isolated but emerges from a toxic Social and ecological System. Ecofeminist reading emphasize that patriarchal violence flows downward from social Systems to families from men to women, from adults to children replacing environmental exploitation. Pecola's body becomes a colonized space - controlled violated and silenced, her desire of blue eyes reflects internalized racism and ecological alienation from her own identity.

Ecofeminism draws parallels between the exploitation of land and female bodies. Pecola's rape mirrors environmental invasion- forced, destructive and irreversible. Her pregnancy, like poisoned land, cannot produce life. The stillbirth Symbolizes complete ecological collapse. Unlike Pecola, Claudia resists dominant beauty standards, She rejects white dolls and questions Cultural values. Claudia's relationship with nature planting seeds, observing seasons-represents eco-conscious resistance Although her seeds do not grow her awareness signals the possibility of future regeneration. Ecofeminism values relationship and relational ethics, care, and empathy-qualities embodied by Claudia's narrative voice.

Racialized Ecology and Environmental Injustice:

African American communities in *The Bluest Eye* occupy neglected spaces poor housing, limited resources, and Social invisibility.
